St. Therese is home to Simbang Gabi - worship as we wait for Jesus


Our Church has been home to Simbang Gabi for many years now, all are always welcome to come and prepare your hearts and minds for the coming of our Lord!

Third Sunday in Advent December 15, 2019

American tele-evangelists are nothing like John the Baptist. They typically anchor large, vast mega -church empires of television, radio, books, internet websites and so on. I stumbled the other day onto one of their channels and discovered a remarkably glitzy presentation. There were five thousand folks, truly dressed in their Sunday-best, packing the church. The minister/evangelist/actor prowled the stage, microphone in hand. He shouted, he sang, he quoted Scripture, he preached and he cried. The audience, raptly engrossed, mirrored back his emotions. Very much like a reed, he bent to their desires and they to his performance.

Jesus makes it clear that the last and greatest of all the prophets, his cousin John, is totally unlike this. John is not a bending, swaying reed but rather a rock of prophecy; a sign of contradiction whose witness will cost him his head. The tele-evangelist was impeccably dressed, costumed would be a better way of saying it, with all the care exhibited by any master craftsmen in the entertainment business. John was uninterested in his appearance and couldn't care less whether others found his dress appropriate or appealing. John's ministry was in the desert waste, while the home of many of the great mega-church leaders is often garishly lavish and techno-sophisticated beyond belief.

John was called to prepare people for the coming of the Messiah. Jesus himself confirmed the Baptist's identity as the forerunner to the Christ by quoting from the prophet Malachi. He also acknowledged his own calling to John's disciples by quoting to them the signs of the Advent from Isaiah. Repentance is John's mission; a necessary opening of the heart to the Spirit of Christ he promises is nigh. To repent is to turn around, not to be confirmed in one's current mis-direction. For that reason, John is anything but soothing or self-affirming. The penitent must travel over long, hot, dusty roads to meet him and then is hardly welcomed with a hug when he arrives. Rather, he is confronted with his complicity in sin. Such confrontation is rare in any American church nowadays, mega or not!

Too many of us expect to be both entertained and emotionally cosseted when we attend church; to be told how right or moral we are and how we are most surely on the right track in the manner in which we now live our lives. Such tactics sell in American religion and some parishes lose their way when they confuse this form of marketing with evangelization. Marketing is manipulation and often involves deception and outright lies. Evangelization, like the holy Mass which is its fount, involves the truth. And whereas the truth of the Gospel, like John crying out in the wilderness, can often seem highly off-putting, it is in reality liberating. Advent involves a turning around back towards the truths taught and witnessed to by our faith. These will never pack churches in modern day America, but they will lead those who choose to buck the trend of the modern age most assuredly to their eternal home where truth, love and beauty abide and where all are free in Christ.

Getting to Know Our Lady: Our Lady of Perpetual Help

On 23 June 1867, Pope Pius IX granted the image its Canonical Coronation along with its present title. The Redemptorist Congregation of priests and brothers are the only religious order currently entrusted by the Holy See to protect and propagate a Marian religious work of art. In the Eastern Orthodox Church iconography, the image is known as the "Virgin Theotokos of the Passion" due to the instruments of the Passion of Jesus Christ present on the image. The feast day of the image is celebrated on June 27, with novena devotions held every Wednesday. Under Pope Pius XII's Pontificate, the image was designated as the national Patroness of the Republic of Haiti and Almoradi, Spain.

Due to promotion by the Redemptorist Priests since 1865, the image has become very popular among Roman Catholics. Modern reproductions are oftentimes displayed in residential homes, commercial establishments, and public transportation. Our Lady of Perpetual Help has been venerated across many cultures and thus bears several titles in different languages, such as "Mother of Perpetual Succour", Mutter von immerwährenden Hilfe, Nuestra Señora del Perpetuo Socorro, Notre-Dame du Perpétuel Secours, Mater del Perpetuo Succursu, and Ina ng Laging Saklolo.
